



"Borders" by Thomas King, now a graphic novel with illustrations by Natasha Donovan, provides a meaningful resource for educators. In ELA & social studies classrooms, "Borders" serves as a catalyst for discussions on identity, sovereignty, and the experiences of Indigenous peoples. The story, which centers on a Blackfoot mother and son at the Canada-U.S. border, uses visual storytelling to make complex topics approachable, encouraging students to explore the intersections of national borders and cultural heritage.
