

1984 by George Orwell

George Orwell's 1984 is a chilling exploration of power, control, and the loss of privacy in a dystopian society ruled by Big Brother. Its themes of surveillance, propaganda, and truth manipulation remain strikingly relevant today, making it a compelling choice for Data Privacy Week discussions. The novel prompts students to reflect on the balance between freedom and control in an increasingly digital world.

While 1984 is ideal for English classes as a cornerstone of dystopian literature, it also provides valuable cross-curricular connections. In Social Studies, it facilitates discussions on governance, civil liberties, media influence, and types of government, encouraging students to connect Orwell's fictional world to real-world systems.

Educators can use key excerpts to explore these themes without requiring a full read, focusing on passages about surveillance, propaganda, and the manipulation of language. Pairing 1984 with related works like *Mockingjay* by Suzanne Collins, *I Am Malala* by Malala Yousafzai, or *The Book Thief* by Markus Zusak allows for engaging and flexible lessons that inspire critical thinking about power, privacy, and freedom.
